# Vision, Space, Desire: Global Perspectives and Cultural Hybridity

On December 13, 2005, the National Museum of the American Indian will convene an international contemporary art symposium to mark the participation of several Native artists at this year's Venice Biennale. The symposium, *Vision, Space, Desire: Global Perspectives and Cultural Hybridity*, will explore indigenous artistic and curatorial practices in relation to the ever-changing realities of the contemporary art world. The symposium will promote an international dialogue and exchange of ideas among Native and non-Native curators, directors, artists, critics, and scholars and open new possibilities in contemporary art practice and engagement.

Vision, Space, Desire will be an occasion for lively discussion and the sharing of new ideas in theory and research. In particular, the symposium core questions will address Native contemporary artistic and curatorial issues in relation to other (Western and Eastern European, African, and Latin American) theoretical discussions and experiences. Topics will include: institutional and alternative spaces of practice; the politics of curatorial practice; globalization, diaspora and indigeneity; and the relevance of postmodern and postcolonial theories in reading Native contemporary art.
